10 Ideas For Cultivating Gratitude Within Our Lives and Homes¹

Model a grateful heart in your home. Teach your children to say thank you, but also require that of yourself with your spouse and with those in your everyday life.

Read God’s Word together. Find Time. Make it part of your drive-time. The Bible or Devotional books recorded / down-loaded. Keep fun devotional books in the car for the children. I know people who take turns reading to each other or listening as they drive.

Pray together every single day. Whether as a family or one-on-one prayer, consciously go before the Lord each day in humility thanking God for blessings and placing our requests at His feet.

Worship together. Find time to worship regularly together. Make attending your church a family priority. Also attend special worship opportunities, Christian concerts or conferences and seminars together.

Communicate, communicate, communicate! Help your children and grandchildren understand why we pray, why we worship, and why we give. Help them comprehend how our love for our Heavenly Father inspires us toward thankfulness and the giving of ourselves.

Serve the less fortunate together as a family. Make it an option for a birthday party instead of the standard bounce house extravaganza! Find ways to serve others as an intention expression of gratitude and thankfulness.

Model sacrifice for others. Our children and families watch us closely. They notice when our actions and our words do not line up.

Keep a personal gratitude journal or list.

Keep a Gratitude Jar. Cut up note-sized pieces of paper putting them in a drawer near the jar with pens and pencils. As you or your kids are standing around the kitchen, each day write out at least one unique thing for which you are thankful and place it in the jar. Or create your own schedule and then choose times to read and share “gratitudes”.

Express thankfulness to those who have gone out of their way to bless you. Whether it is hand writing a thank you card, making a personal phone call, or sending an email or text that includes a picture, intentionally expressing gratitude serves to build up that gratitude muscle!

1. *The faithful love of the Lord never ends! His mercies never cease. Great is his faithfulness; his mercies begin afresh each morning.* -Lamentations 3:23-24 (NLT)
2. *And let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, to which indeed you were called in one body. And be thankful. Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly, teaching and admonishing one another in all wisdom, singing psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, with thankfulness in your hearts to God. And whatever you do, in word or deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him.* -Colossians 3:15-17(ESV)
3. *See that no one repays anyone evil for evil, but always seek to do good to one another and to everyone. Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you.* -1 Thessalonians 5:15-18(ESV)
4. *First of all, then, I urge that supplications, prayers, intercessions, and thanksgivings be made for all people, for kings and all who are in high positions, that we may lead a peaceful and quiet life, godly and dignified in every way. This is good, and it is pleasing in the sight of God our Savior, who desires all people to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth.* -1 Timothy 2:1-4(ESV)
5. *Count it all joy, my brothers, when you meet trials of various kinds, for you know that the testing of your faith produces steadfastness. And let steadfastness have its full effect, that you may be perfect and complete, lacking in nothing.* -James 1:2-4(ESV)

6. *So don't be misled, my dear brothers and sisters. Whatever is good and perfect is a gift coming down to us from God our Father, who created all the lights in the heavens. He never changes or casts a shifting shadow.* -James 1:16-17 (NLT)

The Hands of Christ

My wife's favorite television preacher is Adrian Rogers. For her birthday, her youngest son Peter gave her a copy of one of his books called "What every Christian ought to know".

He writes, "A cathedral in England was destroyed by German bombs during WWII. Some students helped to rebuild it. A statue of Jesus in the cathedral had been damaged. The students pieced it together, but the hands had been destroyed beyond repair. Rather than replace the hands, they placed a plaque beneath the statue that read, "Christ has no hands but ours."

The students hit on a great truth by telling this story. The meaning is clear. All Christians are called to find a place of service, according to the Spiritual gift or gifts that God gives to them. Having found your gift or gifts, let your hands be HIS hands.

When I was a young teacher, I asked another teacher this question---- What do you think about the subject of evolution? His reply was short and to the point." I'm not interested in where I came from, I am only interested in where I am now and where I am going."

He hit that out of the park as far as I am concerned. The Apostle Paul talks about growing spiritually in Ephesians 4: 13-16. It's about Spiritual maturity. In the words of Adrian Rogers, God's standard for growth is spiritual not physical. The ultimate yardstick of your life as a believer is not how much you know but how much you grow. The purpose of this is called transformation. God's standard for a Christian's life is to live in the fullness of Christ. The goal of our maturity is to be like the LORD JESUS CHRIST.

Adrian Rogers tells it this way, "With truth and no love one may swell up. With love and no truth one may blow up. But truth and love cause the Christian to GROW UP."




We will then meet in December for our annual Christmas party (Date, time and place to be announced soon).

Did You Know...?

During the Civil War, one of six Confederate prisoner-of-war camps was built near the town of Andersonville, Georgia. It opened in February, 1864, and covered 16.5 acres. There was a small stream that ran through the middle of the camp that the prisoners used to wash, drink and cook with. Their latrine ran parallel to the stream as well. It was enclosed by a fifteen foot high stockade. By June, 1864, it was enlarged to 26.5 acres in order to handle the large increase in union prisoners. The site was commanded by Captain Henry Wirz.

The guards, disease, starvation and exposure were not all that prisoners had to deal with. A group of prisoners, called the “Andersonville Raiders”, attacked their fellow inmates to steal their food, jewelry, money and clothing. They were armed mostly with clubs and killed to get what they wanted. Another group, called the “Regulators”, tried to stop the larceny and killings. They caught nearly all of the “Raiders”, who were tried by a “Regulator” judge selected by the new prisoners. The jury of their peers found the “Raiders” guilty, set punishment that included running a gauntlet, sent to the stocks and six of the worse were hanged. The entire trial and construction of the gallows was approved and observed by Captain Wirz. The six “Raiders” that were hanged were buried outside the camp's main cemetery.

During the fourteen months of operation, Andersonville received over 45,000 union prisoners. Over 13,000 prisoners died of various causes, as noted above. Andersonville became known as the worst prisoner-of-war camp in the union and confederate armies during the Civil War.

As a side note, after the war Captain Wirz was charged with war crimes, tried by a military court and found guilty. He was the only military officer hanged for war crimes in the history of the United States.


